
Across Islands and Oceans: James Baldwin's Search for Home


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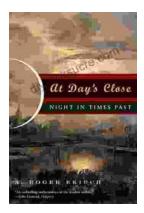


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
