


The Press Box



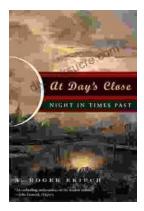
